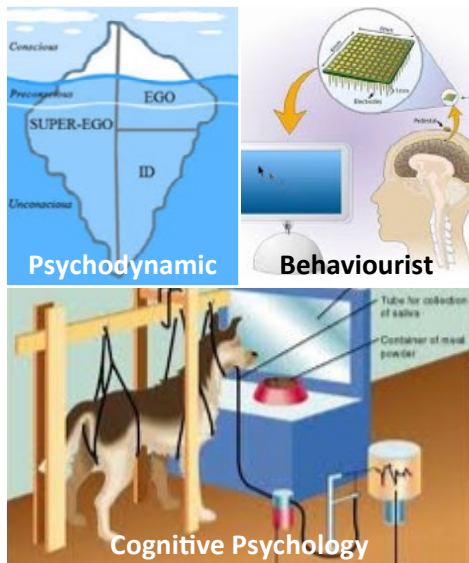

This course has been carefully designed to offer you an accessible, interesting and challenging first year of Psychology. You will gain insight into why people obey authority, why we conform to group norms, why we forget things and why we are shaped by our childhood experiences. You will learn how to treat depression, how to explain eating behaviour and how to undertake practical research and analyse data. Many of these skills are transferable and act as a foundation for you as an independent learner.

The second year builds on the topics covered in year 1 and offers more depth, critical thinking and enhanced analysis. There is an expectation that the debate will broaden and discussions become more aware of the bigger picture. There are added topics such as Biopsychology and three option topics for paper 3.

COURSE STRUCTURE

Paper 1 - Introductory topics in Psychology:

- Memory
- Social influence
- Clinical Psychology and Mental Health
- Attachment

Paper 2 - Psychology in Context:

- Research methods
- Biopsychology
- Approaches

Paper 3 - Issues and Options in Psychology plus one option from each category:

- Relationships
- Schizophrenia
- Forensic psychology
- Issues and debates

THE EXAM

Each paper is two hours long and worth 33.3% of the A Level. There are three exams in total.



WHY PSYCHOLOGY?

As a science, Psychology adds weight and credibility to your A Level options. It opens a range of career opportunities and students often continue on to complete a degree and careers within Psychology and other areas for which Psychology provides a good foundation. There is an overlap with natural sciences for example biology and maths.

PSYCHOLOGY AS A SUBJECT

Studying Psychology at A Level allows students to explain and evaluate human behaviour, undertake research, apply knowledge to case study scenarios and drive their own education as independent learners.

It is recommended that students read additional source materials, attend conferences and seminars independently in order to broaden the subject knowledge and gain experiences which will benefit them in the future.

Psychology lessons are interactive and fun, characterised by debates, discussions and applying knowledge to case study scenarios. It also relies on traditional skills as it involves

mathematics in the research methods topic and essay writing to assess evidence and theories in all other topics. It draws on skills from scientists and humanists alike.

It suits the curiously minded, who would like to further develop critical thinking, and delve deeper into the reasons for, and the issues with, human behaviour!

COURSE DETAILS

EXAMINATION

The course is examined as a whole at the end of Year 13.

Unit 1: Introductory topics in Psychology (Year 1)

Students will study four topics within this unit: Social Influence, Attachment, Memory, Clinical Psychology and Mental Health. Each topic requires students to explain key concepts and ideas, evaluate those ideas using research evidence and also to apply knowledge to an unseen scenario. This paper will include some research methods.

Unit 2: Psychology in context (Year 1 and 2)

For this unit students will study Research Methods, Biopsychology and Approaches. Students are asked to explain and evaluate a range of research methods and will also be assessed on their ability to analyse and perform calculations of data. The 'Approaches' topic includes a range of psychological theories and students will need to be able to describe and evaluate each theory.

Unit 3: Issues and options in Psychology (Year 2)

This unit reflects the pure A-Level content of options chosen as well as underpinning the issues and debates topic. In the Issues and Debates topic, students will explore issues such as gender bias within Psychology. Options chosen at A-Level are Schizophrenia, Relationships and Forensic Psychology.

HOW WILL I BE ASSESSED?

Paper 1: Introductory topics in psychology	33%	Students are assessed on their knowledge, understanding, application and evaluation of Social Influence, Attachment, Memory and Clinical Psychology and Mental Health topics.
Paper 2: Psychology in context	33%	Students are assessed on their knowledge, understanding, application and evaluation of Biopsychology, Approaches, and Research Methods. Data interpretation and mathematical content is also included.
Paper 3: Issues and options in psychology	33%	Students are assessed on their knowledge, understanding, application and evaluation of Schizophrenia, Relationships and Forensic Psychology.
