## Minority Religions

The RE curriculum concentrates mainly on the study of the 6 main world religions - i.e. Christianity, Islam, Judaism, Hinduism, Buddhism and Sikhism.

However, there are many more religions which sizeable numbers of the worldpopulation follow.

For example, Shinto, Confucianism, Bahai, Zoroastrianism, Jain and plenty of other religions which are focused in a particular geographical region – e.g. tribal religions.
