The Course: Eduqas French 603/0071/1

In Gordon's, the course is taught by two French native speakers.

This course is designed to offer you an accessible, interesting and challenging Y12 and Y13. Topics and skills developed at GCSE will be broadened and matured. The topics will provide you with the language and skills to talk and write about issues relevant to you.

The Lower Sixth (Year 12)

The topics we cover in Year 12 are:

- Being a young person in French-speaking society:
 - » Families and citizenship
 - » Youth trends and personal identity
 - » Education and employment opportunities
- Understanding the French-speaking world:
 - » Regional culture and heritage in France, French-speaking countries and communities
 - » Media, art, film and music in the Frenchspeaking world
- Grammar
- A film : Les intouchables (Eric Toledano and Olivier Nakache)

You will sit internal Year 12 exams in the summer to assess your progress.

The Upper Sixth (Year 13)

The second year of the A Level course has been specifically designed to complement the first. You will build on the skills that you have developed over the previous twelve months, revisit the topics seen in Year 12 and expand your knowledge to new areas.

You will also study:

- Diversity and difference
 - » Migration and integration
 - » Cultural identity and marginalization
 - » Cultural enrichment and celebrating



difference

- » Discrimination and diversity
- France 1940-1950: the Occupation and postwar years
 - » From June 1940 May 1945
 - » The cultural dimension in occupied France
 - » 1945-1950: rebuilding and restructuring
- Text : le silence de la mer (Vercors)
- Individual research project (for oral)

The Exam

There will be three papers for the A Level Exam.

- A speaking exam (30%)
- A listening, reading and translation exam (50%)
- A critical response in writing (20%)

The Speaking exam lasts for 21-23 minutes. You will present and discuss an independent research project and then discuss a stimulus card based on one of the A Level topics.

The Listening, Reading and Translation exam lasts 2 hours 30 minutes. There is a listening section, a reading section and a translation section from French to English and English to French.

The Writing exam lasts 2 hours. You will write two 300 word essays from a choice of two questions on the film and the book.

What else you can expect?

• Small class sizes – more attention from the

teacher.

- A variety of teaching methods seminars, role play, independent study, research.
- Access to our online learning space.
- Chance to take part in our KS3/KS4 trips to France and do work experience abroad.
- Helping in KS3 classes and on school trips.
- Going to films festivals in and around London.
- 1 to 1 weekly conversation classes with the language assistant.

Requirements

You will need at least a 6 at GCSE to study a language at Gordon's.

Career prospects

Journalism, Tourism, Medicine, Engineering, Law, Music, Environment work, Business management, Politics, Sport, Acting, Constructions, Catering, Hospitality, Publishing, Banking, Teaching (the list is endless).

Beyond A Level, the ratio of applicants to courses to study languages are among the best in the country and unemployment rates for language graduates are the lowest after medicine, dentistry and education. 30% of language graduates work in business services, 12% in manufacturing, 11% in finance.

COURSE DETAILS

Examination

The course is examined as a whole at end of Year 13.

Unit 1: Social Issues and Trends

Students will study three topics within this unit; families and citizenship, youth trends and personal identity and education and employment opportunities.

Unit 2: Understanding the French speaking world

For this unit students will study regional culture and heritage in France, media, art, film and music in the French speaking world.

Prescribed works:

Short story: Vercors: Le Silence de la Mer Film: Éric Toledano, Olivier Nakache: Les Intouchables.

Unit 3: Diversity and difference

In this unit students will study migration and integration, cultural identity and marginalization, cultural enrichment and difference and discrimination and diversity.

Unit 4: France 1940-1950

Students will study June 1940-May 1945, The cultural dimension in occupied France and 1945-1950.

HOW WILL I BE ASSESSED?

Exam Papers Year 13	% of GCE	Details
Paper 1: Speaking	30%	The speaking assessment will last 21-23 minutes in total. In addition, prior to commencement of the assessment, candidates will have five minutes' preparation time.
Paper 2: Listening, Reading and Translation	50%	Stimulus material will be in French, based on the four themes under the areas of interest: social issues and trends and political and/or intellectual and/or artistic culture.
Paper 3: Critical response in Writing	20% Candidates write an essay of approximately 300 words on each of the two works they have studied. One essay will be based on a literary work and the second on an additional literary work or film from the prescribed list.
