THE RULE OF ONE?

Short stories are short and sweet. The more you include, the messier they get.

Stick to the rule of one:

- One main character - place most of the focus on them.
- One setting/scene – jumping around is tough to write well
- One major conflict/problem to solve
- One theme/message

HOW DO YOU GET STARTED? BY ENDING.

Plenty of writers start a great story, not all can finish it.

Plotting your story, especially how it ends, is one of the most important parts of writing.

DON'T START UNTIL YOU KNOW THE ENDING!

PREPARING TO WRITE HORROR FICTION

Tasks

- List **vocabulary** that you think would suit horror: graveyard, mist, night, moonlight, mould....
- Practise **building suspense**. e.g. Turn this example that fails to build suspense into one that does create tension (clue: add lots of detail) – ‘Michael walked up to his friend’s house, walked inside and upstairs, and found his friend dead in the bath.’
- **Showing not telling**. ‘The ‘golden rule’? ‘She was scared’ doesn’t work in the same way as: ‘She closed the curtain quickly. She had definitely heard something....’ Show, don’t tell. Try this one – ‘The church was scary’. Now improve it and then you’re ready for your own story!

- Description of your scene is vital to build suspense and create atmosphere.
- You don’t need blood and gore! Where can you go from here? Horror stories are about suspense....
- One character, one setting, one conflict, one message
