Reciprocity

Renewal

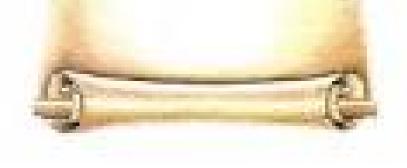

- Grade 9 is beyond an A*
- Grade 5 is a strong pass
- Grade 4 is a standard pass

Support from home

 - If no prep, they can read
 - GCSE Bitesize





Support from home

Literacy

- SPaG 20% of assessment criteria in English (a percentage in all subjects)
- Problem-solving in Maths
- Often a limiting factor of student achievement
- Insist on 30 minutes private reading on most days
- Less time on social media!





From a student's perspective

- Students who achieve great grades consistently over time:
 - work hard (average effort grade below 2.0)
 - have high attendance
 - find a balance between studies and other interests
 - stay for prep
 - spend the right amount of time on prep
 - are resilient

- 4. Next Steps Advice at the end of the year (Year 10)

















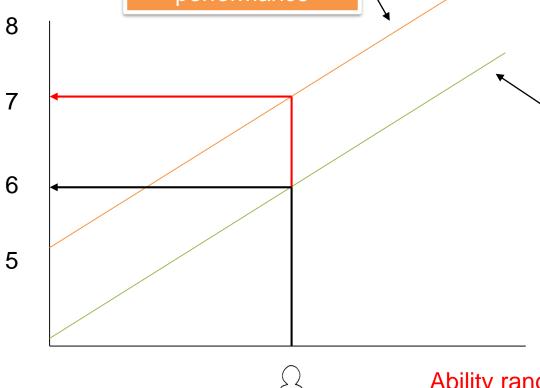
A Grade Higher

Represents 'average' student performance





















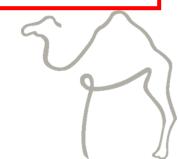


Effort Grades

- 1 = Outstanding
- 2 = Very Good
- 3 = Good but occasionally inconsistent
- 4 = Cause for concern
- 5 = Unacceptable

Typical Year Group Effort grade profile

- Top 25% = Below 1.5
- Middle 50% = 1.5 to 2.0
- Bottom 25% = Above 2.0





Effort is king

- Bottom 20 Y11s for effort last year.
- Average effort grade 2.47
- Average grade 5.7 (mostly Bs with some As)
- Top 20 Y11s
- Average effort grade 1.3
- Average grade 6.7 (mostly A*s and As)

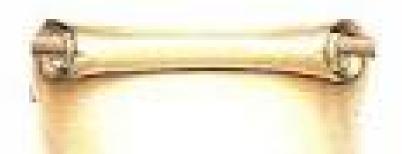

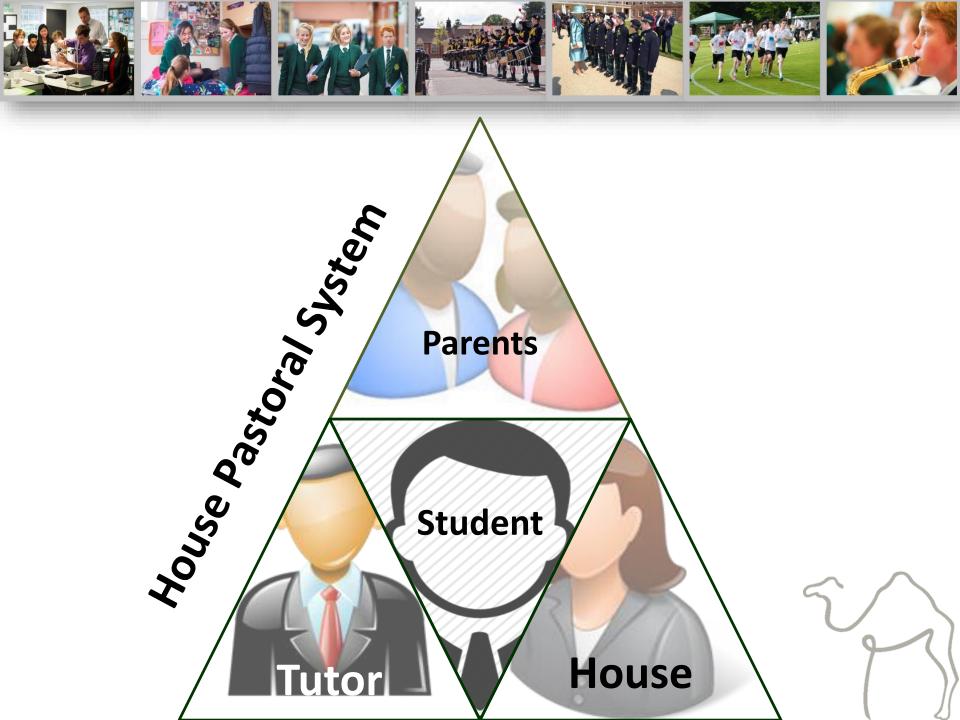

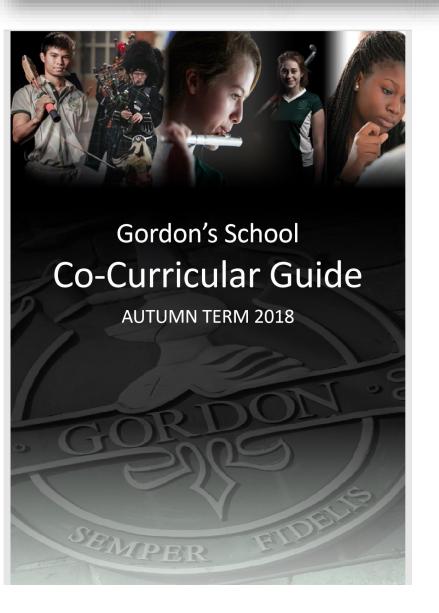
