# Multi Mini Interviews (MMIs)

- Normally between 6-9 stations, lasting between 5 and 9 minutes each
- Stations include:
  - Interaction with actors
  - Discussion of ethical issues
  - Work Experience & Personal Statement
  - News & Current Affairs
  - Can be random e.g. explain how to tie a shoe-lace



### **Example MMI questions/stations**

- Do you like libraries and why do you think we should have libraries?
- How would you make your GP surgery more friendly for deaf people?
- Last week a patient came to see you. You misdiagnosed him and consequently he died. His next of kin, Sandy Smith, came to see you today, go and talk to them.
- Watch this video of a simple first aid procedure then perform it on your neighbour, Alex, who has just been involved in an accident in their home. You may only watch the video once.
- You have just reversed over your neighbour's cat, knock on her door and explain to her what happened.

- It is a 2 hour paper based test that is offered once a year in September and October
- It tests your ability to apply scientific and mathematical knowledge, as well as problem solving, critical thinking and written communication skills

- It tests verbal, quantitative and abstract reasoning, as well as decision analysis and situational judgement



All of the boxes in the sets contain zig-zags, and at least one small black shape. In Set A, the zig-zag consists of three connected lines (a 'Z' shape), whereas in Set B, the zig-zag consists of four connected lines (a 'W' or 'M' shape)

Shape 1: correct answer is B (Set B). The zig-zag here is made up of four connected lines, thus must fit into Set B.

Shape 2: correct answer is C (Neither). There is more than one zig-zag shape, and they each are made up of two connected lines, so fit neither set.

Shape 3: correct answer is A (Set A). The zig-zag is made up of three connected lines.

Shape 4: correct answer is C (Neither). The zig-zag is made up of five connected lines, thus it does not fit into either set.

Shape 5: correct answer is A (Set A). The zig-zag is made up of three connected lines, hence fits Set A.

















Mark cycles from his house to Brighton in 2 hours, 15 minutes. He had three 5 minute rests. When he left, the reading on his odometer was 1086 miles. When he arrived, the reading on his odometer was 1108 miles.

- 1 km = 0.6124 miles
- 1. What was Mark's average speed whilst cycling?
- A. 5.5 mph
- B. 8.8 mph
- C. 9.8 mph
- D. 11 mph
- E. 22 mph
- 2. How many kilometres has Mark's bike done when he arrives in Brighton?
- A. 35.4 km
- B. 688.5 km
- C. 1747.7 km
- D. 1772.8 km
- E. 1783.1 km
- 3. Mark can do the same journey in 38 minutes by car. How much faster is Mark's average driving speed compared to his average cycling speed?
- A. 17.9 mph
- B. 22.1 mph
- C. 23.7 mph
- D. 24.9 mph
- E. 38.2 mph

















#### 1. Correct answer is D (11 mph).

We know that speed = distance/time. The distance Mark travels to Brighton is: 1108 miles - 1086 miles = 22 miles. The journey takes 2 hours, 15 minutes, but if we take away the rest time (3 x 5 minutes = 15 minutes), the time taken is 2 hours. Thus speed = 22/2 = 11 mph.

2. Correct answer is E (1783.1 km).

It is given that 1 km = 0.6214 miles. He has done 1108 miles by the time he has arrived in Brighton, therefore: 1108/0.6124 = 1783.1 km.

3. Correct answer is C (23.7 mph).

From Question 1, we know the distance travelled is 22 miles. The time taken (38 minutes) has to be converted to hours by dividing by 60 (38/60 = 0.6333). Therefore, the speed of the car is: 22/0.6333 = 34.7 mph speed.

The difference between the two is: 34.7 - 11 = 23.7 mph faster

A consultation is taking place between a senior doctor and a patient; a medical student is observing. The senior doctor tells the patient that he requires some blood tests to rule out a terminal disease. The senior doctor is called away urgently, leaving the medical student alone with the patient. The patient tells the student that he is worried he is going to die and asks the student what the blood tests will show.





