

AS Level and A Level

AS Geography

All students will be expected to study for the new stand-alone AS Geography in their first year. Like all the other A Levels this will not count towards the A Level grade.

Unit 1: Dynamic landscapes

Includes coastal systems and management as well as tectonic and other hazards and their impact on societies.

- Written exam: 1 hour 45 minutes
- 90 marks
- 50% of AS

Unit 2: Dynamic places

A focus on human geography on an international scale including the study of globalisation. Reshaping places also offers a fascinating focus on urban and rural geography.

- Written exam: 1 hour 45 minutes
- 90 marks
- 50% of AS

Fieldwork

Gordon's has a strong history of 'in the field' research and this continues today. We currently conduct a four day residential trip to the Isle of Wight at A Level and plan further expeditions to add value to our learning and to reinforce learnt knowledge and skills—included within paper 1 and 2.

A Level Geography

Unit 1: Dynamic landscapes

Including the study of water and carbon cycles (rivers and the atmosphere) as well examining student's knowledge of coastal geography and hazards from last year to a higher standard.

- Written exam: 2 hours 15 minutes
- 105 marks
- 30% of A-level



Unit 2: Dynamic places

A fascinating study into the nature of change across places economically, demographically and culturally as well as building upon the previous year's global studies. Also topics on resource usage and related conflicts.

- Written exam: 2 hours 15 minutes
- 105 marks
- 30% of A Level

Unit 3: Synoptic paper

An investigation into all aspects of geography you will have studies with questions based upon a resource booklet - 20% of A Level

Geographical Investigation

A fieldwork project using the field trip data. Work can be completed at home and the result will be both something the students are proud of as well as 20% towards their A Level!

- 3,000-4,000 words
- 70 marks
- 20% of A-level
