1	Will all students return on March 8 <sup>th</sup> ?	<ul> <li>Yes</li> <li>All students should have been tested by Sunday March 7<sup>th</sup>.</li> <li>Please see earlier email for more details.</li> </ul>
2	What is the on-going plan for testing students?	<ul> <li>Students who need their second and third tests will be done during the school day.</li> <li>After the third test we will be giving students self-testing kits to be taken and used at home each week.</li> </ul>

4	What will happen before students return?	<ul> <li>Classrooms have been regularly cleaned and are set out to comply with guidelines and Houses prepared for students' return.</li> <li>Parents are asked to inform us if any students or their immediate family members have shown any symptoms of COVID-19 during the 10 days before returning to school.</li> <li>Please use the safeguarding number 01276 859734 to report any positive cases.</li> </ul>
5	How will social distancing be managed?	<ul> <li>The guidelines advise that students should keep to 'bubbles' during the day, within which social distancing is not required. The guidelines also allow for membership of more than one bubble. Students will be in year group bubbles throughout the day in classrooms and in allocated areas in houses.</li> <li>Student numbers in changing rooms are controlled to allow social distancing.</li> <li>For all co-curricular activities, consistent groups will be maintained though comprised of students from different year groups and different houses.</li> </ul>
6	How will symptoms be managed	<ul> <li>As before, Day boarders will report to the School Office and arrangements will be made for them to return home to take a PCR test before returning to school.</li> <li>Residential boarders will report to the School Office and school staff will arrange for a PCR test.</li> </ul>
6b	What will happen if there is a case of Covid-19 in the School?	<ul> <li>In the event of positive test result it is likely that, given the more stringent rules defining close contact, the whole year will need to self-isolate for 10 days at home.</li> <li>As before, in such cases students will access live-streamed lessons.</li> </ul>

		<ul> <li>Should a residential boarder test positive, they will be isolated in the Medical Centre for 10 days or until they have either been taken home or to their Guardian, within 48 hours of testing. All other members of the household will be required to self-isolate in line with Government guidance.</li> <li>As required by all schools, we will actively engage with the PHE Test &amp;Trace and follow their advice regarding other students who may be required to isolate.</li> </ul>
7	Will there still be a staggered lunchtime?	<ul> <li>Yes.</li> <li>Y11-13 will have a lunch break between 11.45-12.45pm, while Y7-10 will have a lunch break between 12.40-1.45pm.</li> </ul>
8	Must students wear face coverings indoors?	<ul> <li>Face covering should be worn in all indoor spaces, including lessons and Houses until the end of term because social distancing is difficult to maintain.</li> <li>Face-coverings will be required whilst queuing to enter classrooms and the Dining Hall, and also in PE changing rooms.</li> <li>They will also be required in House, with the exception of residential Houses.</li> <li>If worn, face coverings must be of plain colour, without any form of personalisation and scarfs/snoods and other irregular types are not permitted.</li> <li>Please be mindful that the wearing of a face covering may inhibit communication with people who rely on lip reading, facial expressions and clear sound. This may apply in lessons.</li> </ul>
8b	Must students wear face coverings outside?	• No
9	Will there be an exeat this term?	<ul> <li>No. A normal weekend programme will operate, including Saturday school for day boarders.</li> <li>Residential students will not be charged</li> </ul>
10	Will students wear school uniform?	<ul> <li>Yes, normal school uniform is to be worn and students are permitted to wear their hoody or green school jumper under their blazer until Easter.</li> <li>Please note that sixth form students are not permitted to wear a hoody under their jackets but may wear any plain jumper befitting of business attire.</li> <li>On the day on which a student has P6 games, they must come to school in sports kit with tracksuit trousers and green hoody over this, which they will then take off for P6 itself.</li> </ul>
11	What additional cleaning and sanitising will there be?	<ul> <li>Extra evening cleaning is in place.</li> <li>Washroom areas are cleaned thoroughly after the morning and lunch breaks as well as in the evenings.</li> <li>Sanitising wipes are provided in all classrooms for wipe down of tables and chairs between lessons.</li> <li>Houses, entrances to buildings and other areas have sanitisers available.</li> </ul>

		Students will be reminded regularly on the need to wash their hands thoroughly and frequently, in particular on arrival at school, returning to House at breaks and before meals.
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12	What about large meetings - Assemblies, Chapel, Parades?	<ul> <li>It may be a while before we can have large-scale gatherings. Until then, we will work within the relevant guidelines.</li> <li>Year Group Assemblies will be held in the Rec.</li> <li>Chapel services and House Meetings will continue by Year Group.</li> <li>Spring Term Parades are cancelled. Please await further details on the Summer Term.</li> </ul>
13	Will there be prep?	<ul> <li>Yes. This will be by Year Group as normal, in classrooms that will have been cleaned after 3.35pm.</li> <li>Students will be pre-allocated to a prep room where attendance will be registered.</li> <li>Y7 prep will run from 6.00pm until 6.45pm, at which point Y7 day boarders will return home.</li> </ul>
14	How will Houses cope with Year Group 'bubbles'	<ul> <li>Day Houses will continue to keep students in their year group areas when inside the House, wherever possible.</li> <li>Staff will control the access to locker rooms to allow for social distancing between year groups.</li> <li>Residential Houses will operate as individual households.</li> <li>Students will be encouraged to be outside as much as possible in dry weather.</li> </ul>
15	What are the arrangements for break times?	Students are advised to bring their own snacks for morning break as tuck shops will not be open.
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16	Will there be changes to movement around the school?	<ul> <li>Within buildings where practical, there are separate entrances and exits</li> <li>Externally, there is no one-way system (for example across the Parade Square) but students are encouraged to distance themselves from students in other Year Groups</li> <li>There are organised arrangements for students waiting to enter a building</li> </ul>
17	Will there be any change to pick up and drop off arrangements?	<ul> <li>Day Boarders can arrive in Houses any time between 7.45-8.15am, ready to go to their first commitment starting at 8.20am.</li> <li>Pick-ups at the end of the day will remain as normal though parents are advised to stay in cars when picking up.</li> <li>We encourage students to walk or cycle to school if they can.</li> </ul>
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18	Are there any extra items that students should bring to school each day?	<ul> <li>Yes, three items:</li> <li>Students are required to bring a <u>water bottle</u> in each day, especially as all water fountains are sealed for safety reasons. Water will be available in Houses for re-filling water bottles.</li> </ul>

19	Is attendance compulsory in March? What happens if my son/daughter is unwilling to return because of safety concerns?	<ul> <li>Students should also have their own small bottle of hand sanitiser. There will be re-fill facilities in each House.</li> <li>Third, all students should have their own small packet of paper handkerchiefs.</li> <li>Yes. We will continue to report our attendance data to the Local Authority which will review it accordingly.</li> <li>Attendance below 90% would raise an initial concern and initiate possible intervention by the Area Inclusion Officer.</li> <li>We are satisfied that we comply with all guidance on reopening of schools and therefore students and parents can have full confidence in a safe return to school.</li> </ul>
20	What provision is in place to support students' mental health?	<ul> <li>We recognise that students may need extra support to adjust to school. A sense of routine is important and the House system will help bring our community together again. Heads of Houses and their tutor teams will provide the first level of support and care for students' well-being and mental health. This may then be formalised in an Individual Welfare Plan or referred to Mrs Forster. Mrs Forster will offer support from Mr Cherry, Ms Beecham, Teresa Wilcox, School Nurses or the School Counselling Service which we have made available to more students this term. Students can also continue to self-refer on their Firefly dashboard.</li> <li>House Parents will revisit the programme to support students on their return to school.</li> </ul>
21	How has the behaviour policy been reviewed to acknowledge the increased levels or trauma and anxiety experienced by students and impacts on engagement, selfesteem and behaviours?	<ul> <li>The Discipline, Rewards and Sanctions Policy has a Covid-19 appendix outlining additional information in response to the current situation. This is reviewed weekly.</li> <li>Students will receive information about behaviour expectations and well-being support during assemblies.</li> </ul>
22	Are parents allowed on site?	<ul> <li>In line with Government guidance, parents are asked not to attend the school site without an agreed appointment with a member of staff. Where possible meetings will either be by telephone or video call such as Zoom or Teams. Face to face meetings will only take place where absolutely necessary.</li> <li>For residential boarders please see separate guidance from Houses.</li> </ul>
23	Should students bring in a bag?	Yes. Main School students are encouraged to carry their equipment, along with a water-bottle and hand-sanitiser if they wish, in a bag of their choice to and from lessons. Equipment for periods 1-4 will be needed throughout the morning, with an opportunity to change over for periods 5&6 at lunchtime.
24	Where can 6 <sup>th</sup> Form park their cars?	Parking is only available to Y13 students with a permit which will be issued on a first-come first-serve basis.

1	Will the School quarantine residential boarding students before the start of term?	Quarantine requirements change; parents should monitor closely whether their son/daughter is affected by these controls as situations are changing on a regular basis.
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2	How will the residential Houses be affected by COVID-19 and social distancing issues?	<ul> <li>Houses can be classed as a household and there is no limit on the number of boarders in a residence. Students do not need to be socially distanced in their House at all times, although we will take sensible precautions and educate students in being prudent in the way that they spend time with one another in the House.</li> <li>Precautions will include ensuring students keep a sensible distance from one another in communal spaces to ensure that students can still socialise and do so safely.</li> </ul>
3	What happens if there is a	All members of the House, students and staff, will be required to isolate in the House for 10 days
3	confirmed case of Covid-19 in the House?	<ul> <li>All members of the House, students and staff, will be required to isolate in the House for 10 days.</li> <li>If a Residential Boarder presents with symptoms of Covid-19, the School will arrange for a test.</li> <li>If positive then the identified student must isolate for a minimum of 10 days, while everyone else within the household group will be required to quarantine.</li> <li>The local Health Protection team will be informed and will advise on further intervention. Residential Boarders may return home for their period of isolation or quarantine.</li> </ul>
4	Can Residential Boarders leave site?	<ul> <li>Sixth form students are not permitted to leave site during the school day for any reason other than to return home at the end of their day. Social distancing and use of masks is mandatory.</li> <li>Key Stage 4 students are not permitted to walk to the local shops between 5.00pm and 6.00pm on Fridays.</li> <li>If a Residential Boarder wishes to leave site without direct supervision, stringent checks must be made by House staff to ensure that all government guidance on social distancing, gatherings and mixing households is in place and can be reasonably assured. This will only be allowed once both House Parents and parents and are in agreement. The School reserves the right to over-rule a parent's decision on this matter if a risk to other students or staff is identified.</li> </ul>

The Houses will also support students throughout this period and will be a 'first port of call' for any student experiencing difficulties.</li> </ul>
