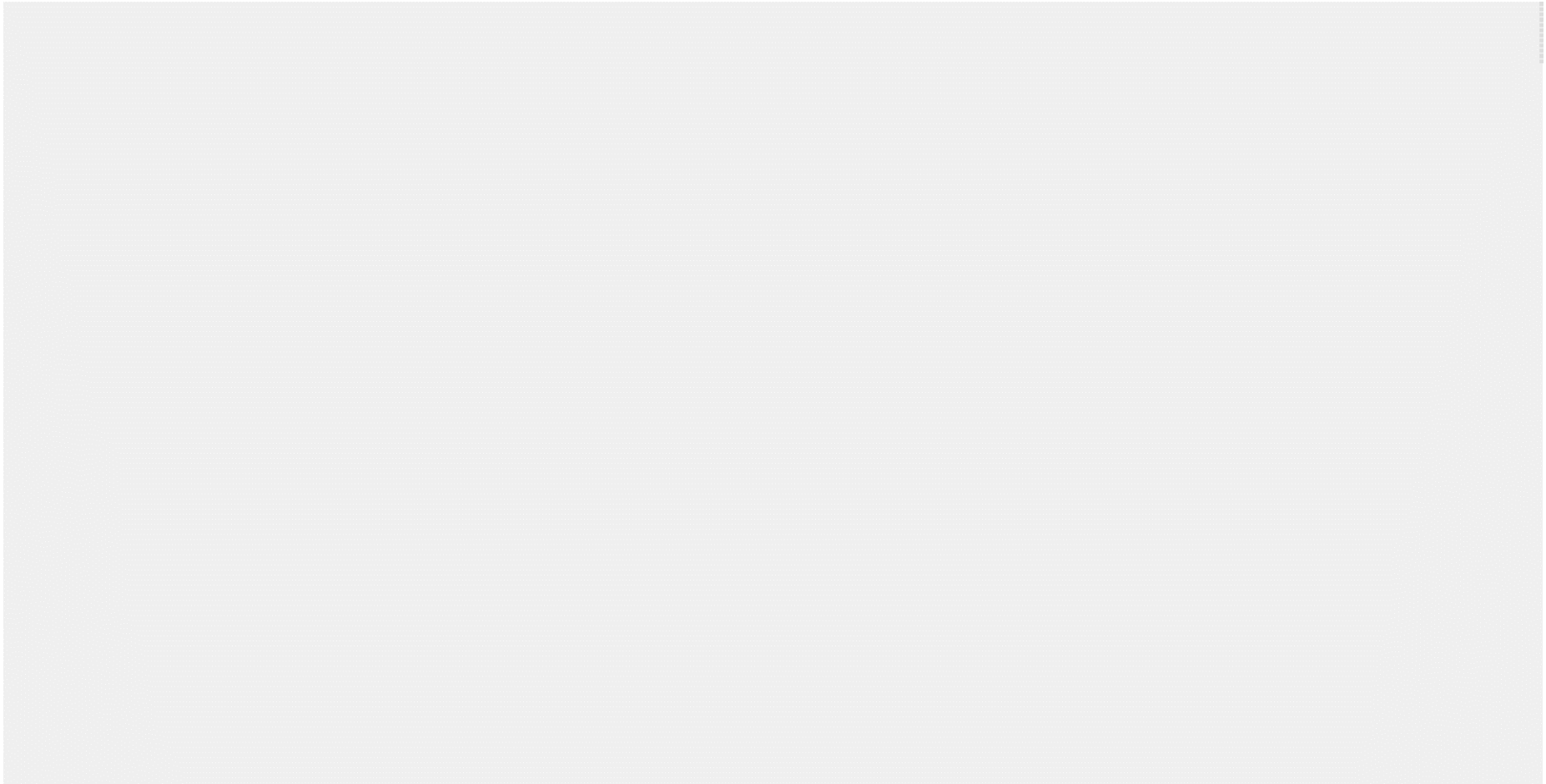

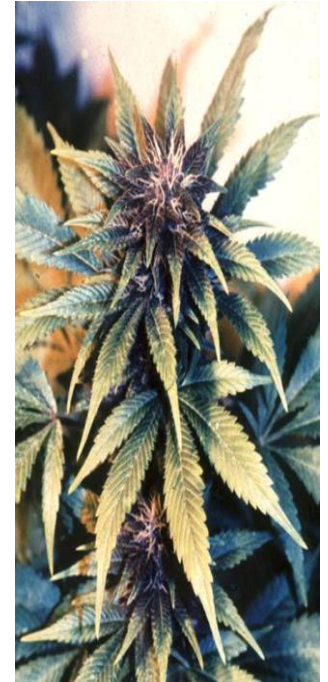

# Dangers of Vaping for Teens

---

Besides nicotine, e-cigarettes can contain harmful and potentially harmful ingredients, including:

- ultrafine particles that can be inhaled deep into the **lungs**.
- flavorants such as diacetyl, a chemical linked to serious lung disease.
- volatile organic compounds.
- heavy metals, such as nickel, tin, and lead.

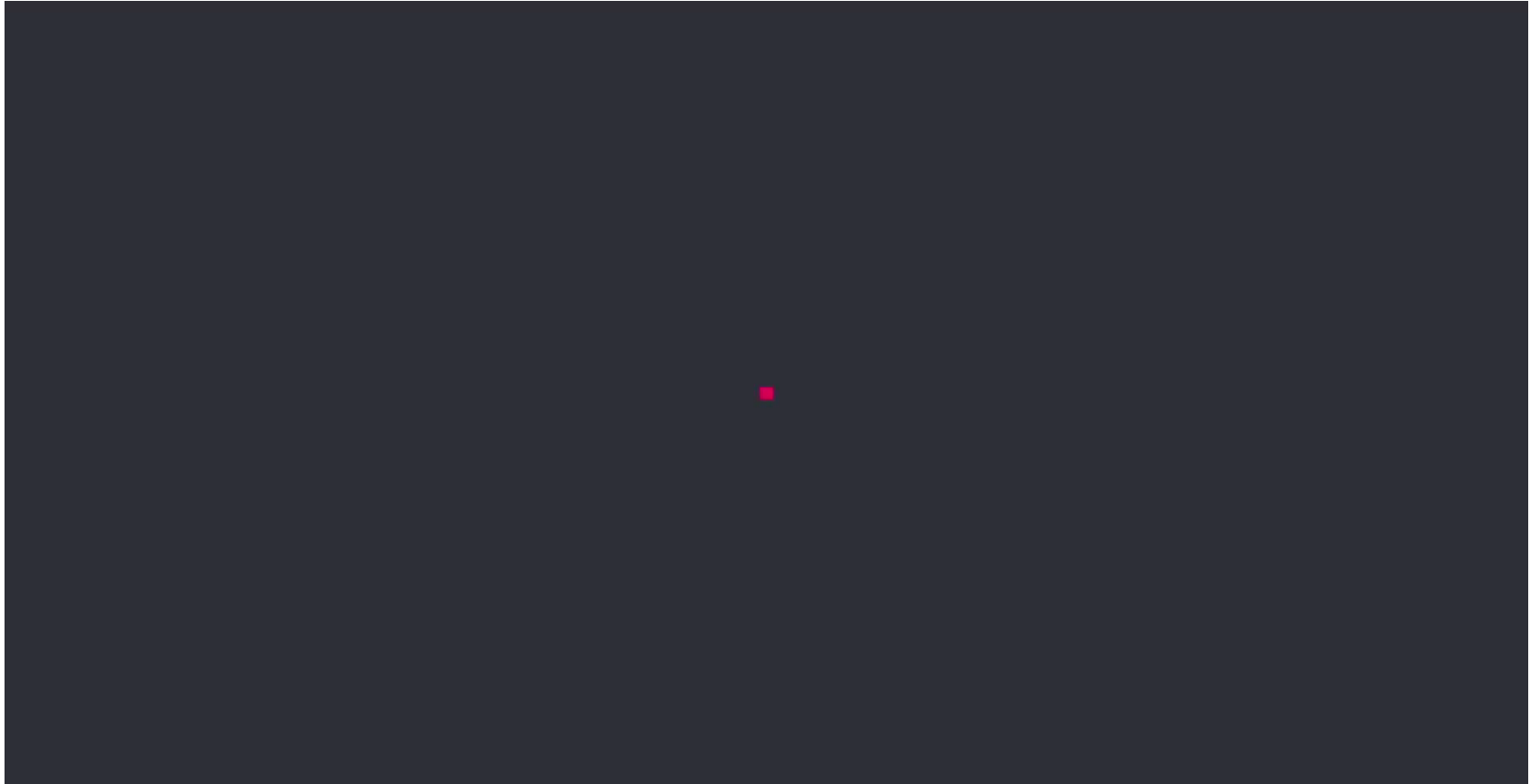
Data from government-funded research prompts fresh questions about effect of social media and school stresses on young people's mental health

One in four girls is clinically depressed by the time they turn 14, according to research that has sparked new fears that Britain's teenagers are suffering from an epidemic of poor mental health.

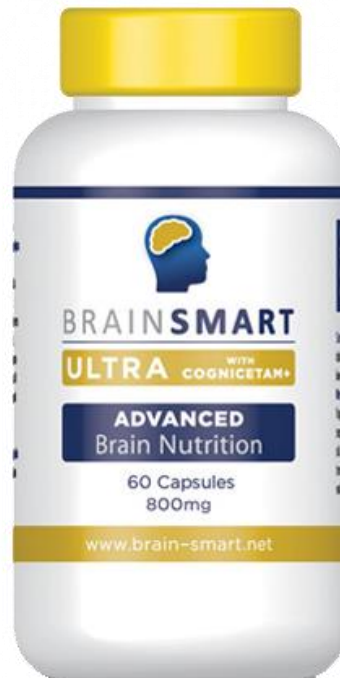

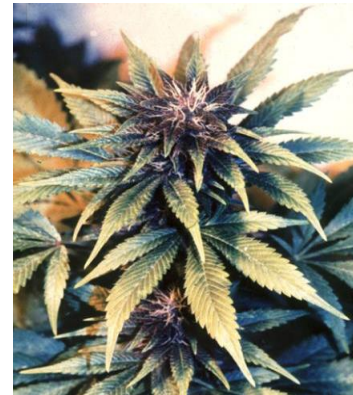


Possession with intent to supply

# Home Office Regulations

---

There is no entitlement to a passport and no statutory right to have access to a passport. The decision to issue, withdraw, or refuse a British passport is at the discretion of the Secretary of State for the Home Department (the Home Secretary) under the Royal Prerogative. and, the Home Office has the power to confiscate passports if a UK citizen is engaged in Criminal Activities at home or overseas



# Cannabis & Overseas Travel

---

**Warning comes amid rise in expulsions under federal law – even in states where drug is legal**

A legal expert at an international immigration firm has warned British tourists and employees that if they smoke marijuana in the US, even in states where it has been legalised, they risk being barred from the country for life. UK visitors can still be arrested and deported from the US even if they consume cannabis in states such as California and Colorado, where the drug is legal, said Charlotte Slocombe, a senior partner at Fragomen in London.

## **Amsterdam drugs: Tourists face ban from cannabis cafes**

Amsterdam Mayor Femke Halsema wants to ban foreign tourists from cannabis cafes to tackle anti-social behaviour and push the city upmarket.

The Mayor has a plan. Cutting off the lifeblood of cannabis tourism, she believes, will deter that type of visitor and reduce the kind of conduct often associated with them. Most of the Netherlands already requires visitors to coffee shops to show proof of residence, but the rule is not enforced in the capital.

# New Legislation

---

It's illegal to drive if either:

- you're unfit to do so because you're on legal or illegal drugs
- you have certain levels of illegal drugs in your blood (even if they haven't affected your driving)

# Drug Driving Regs

---

## Drug-Drive Limits For Illicit And Prescription Substances

The limits for illicit substances are: ug/L = microgramme per litre

- Benzoylecgonine - 50 µg/L
- Cocaine - 10 µg/L
- Delta-9-Tetrahydrocannabinol (Cannabis and Cannabinol) - 2 µg/L
- Ketamine - 20 µg/L
- Lysergic Acid Diethylamide (LSD) - 1 µg/L
- Methylamphetamine - 10 µg/L
- Methylenedioxymethamphetamine (MDMA – Ecstasy) - 10 µg/L
- 6-Monoacetylmorphine (6-MAM – Heroin and Morphine) - 5 µg/L

# Drug Driving Regs

---

The limits for substances most frequently available on prescription are:

- Clonazepam - 50 µg/L
- Diazepam - 550 µg/L
- Flunitrazepam - 300 µg/L
- Lorazepam - 100 µg/L
- Methadone - 500 µg/L
- Morphine - 80 µg/L
- Oxazepam - 300 µg/L
- Temazepam - 1000 µg/L

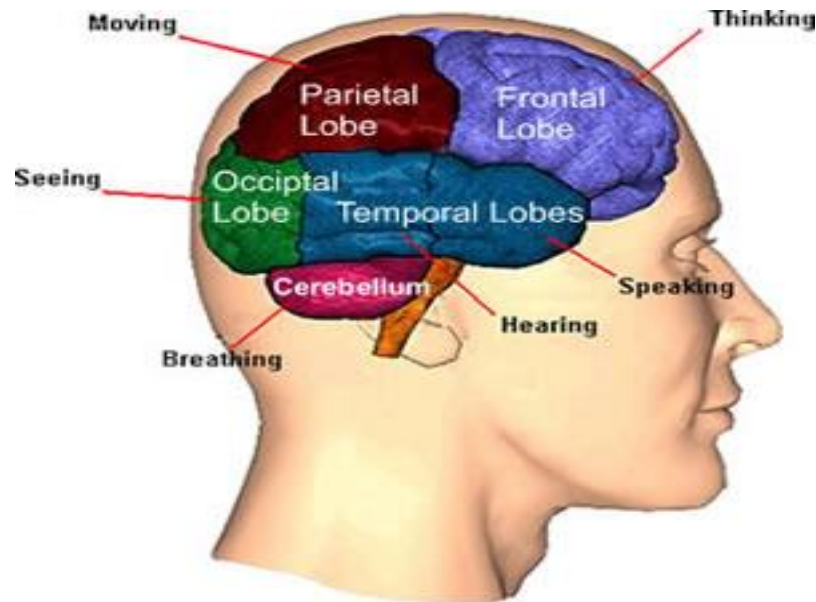

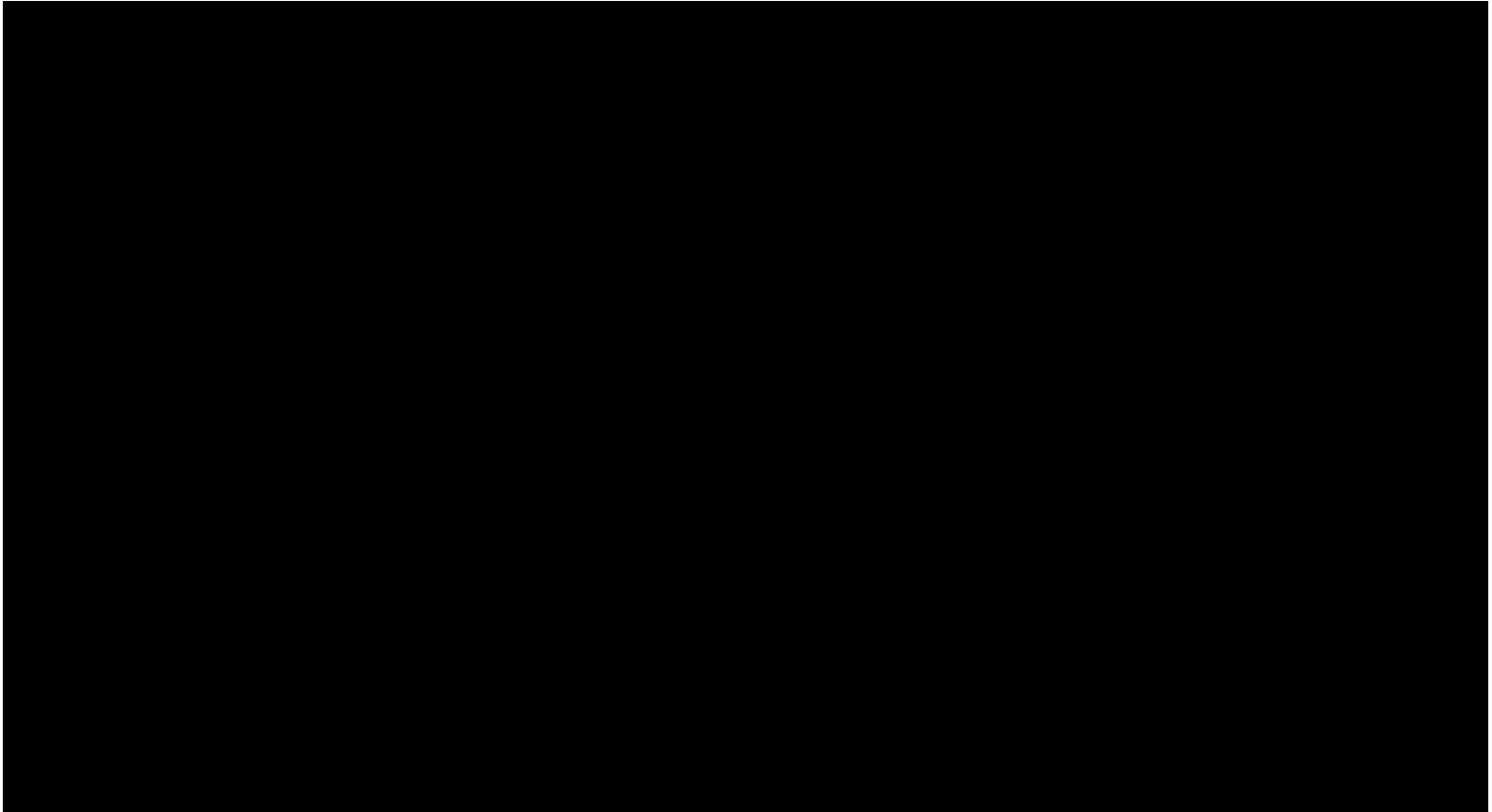
# Alcohol affects the brain

  - Breathing



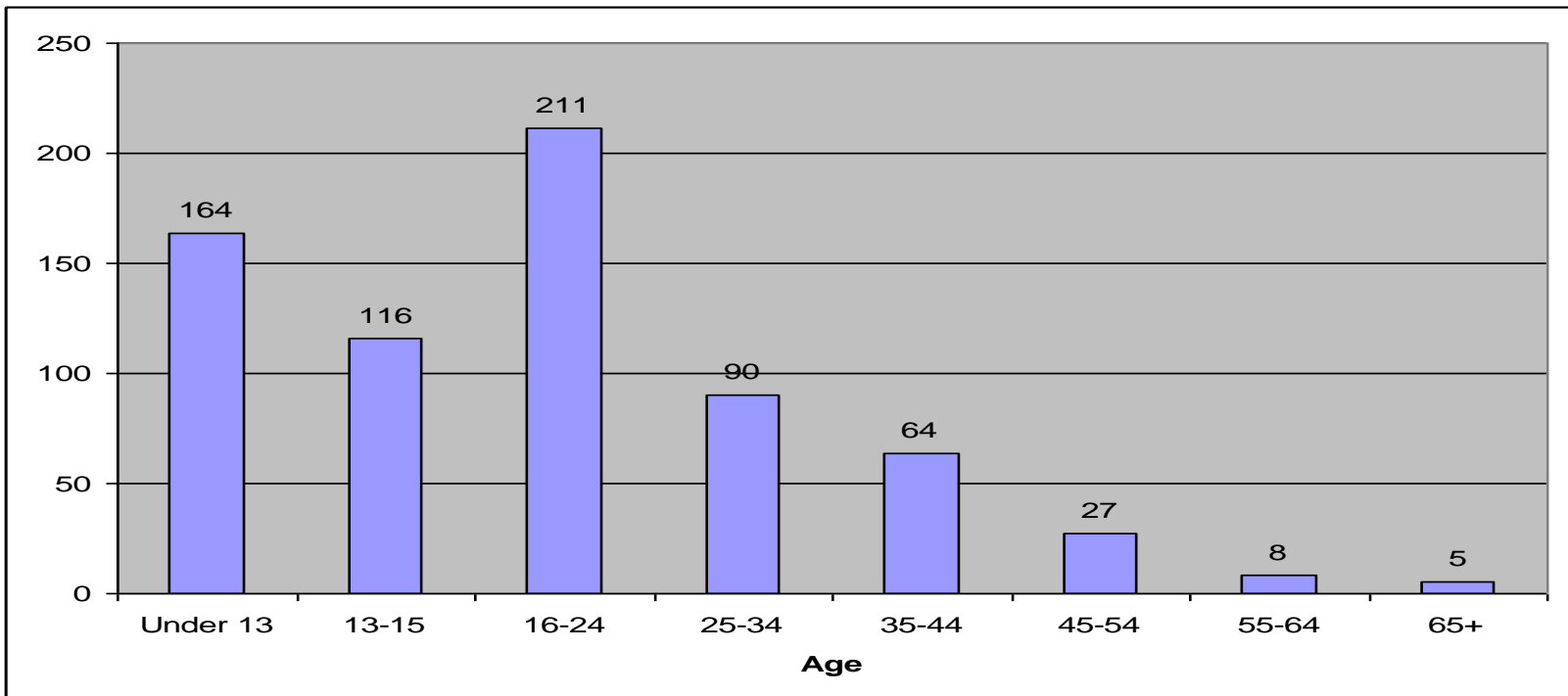

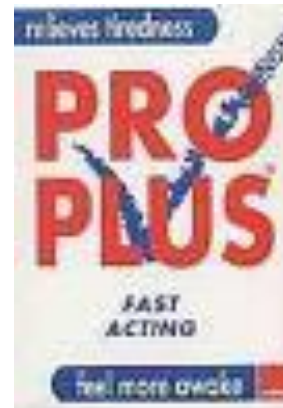

# Sexual Offences Act

---

- **Rape** – now classified as penetration by the penis of the vagina, anus or mouth without consent.
- **Assault by penetration** – penetration of anus or vagina by any part of the body or object.
- **Sexual Assault** – any kind of intentional sexual touching of somebody else without their consent
- **Administering a substance with intent** spiking drinks with any substance with intent to carry out sexual activity.

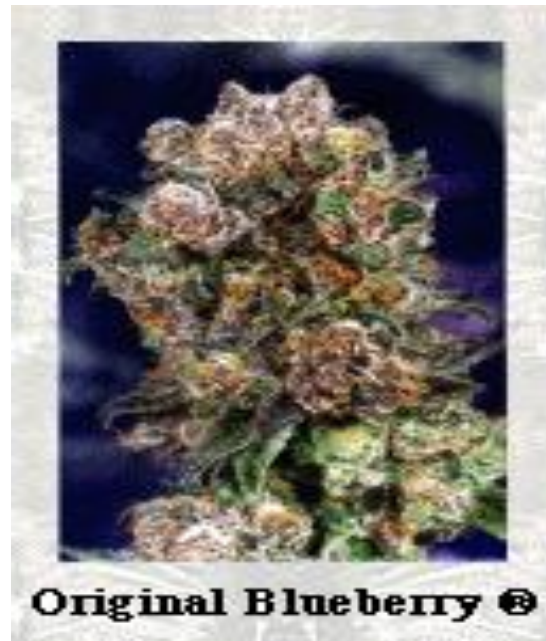
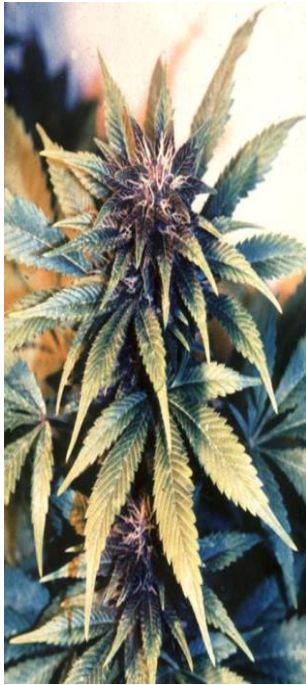

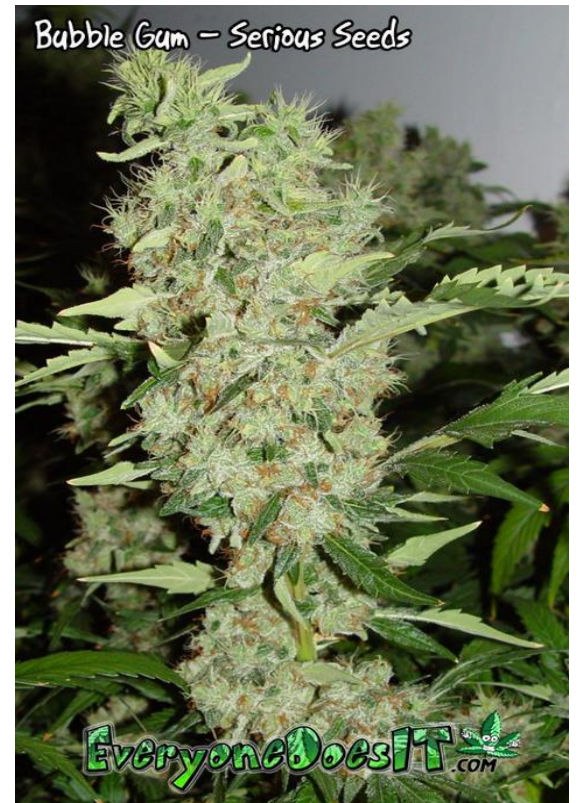

# Cannabidiol aka CBD

---

- Cannabidiol (CBD) is a cannabinoid – a chemical compound that acts throughout the body, including on certain parts of the brain
- For CBD oil to be legal in the UK, it must have a THC content of less than 0.2%
- It is illegal to sell or to supply to anyone under the age of 18
- Rules vary from Country to Country

# Vaping CBD & The Immune System

---

As a potential immunosuppressant, CBD may reduce the immune system's inflammatory responses, promote apoptosis (cellular death), and prevent rapid cellular growth. In certain cases, these features may have a negative effect on a healthy human's immune system.

In addition, CBD exposure may also suppress the functions of cytokines, chemokines, and T cells – all of which play an important role in immunodefense.

# Effects of Edibles

---

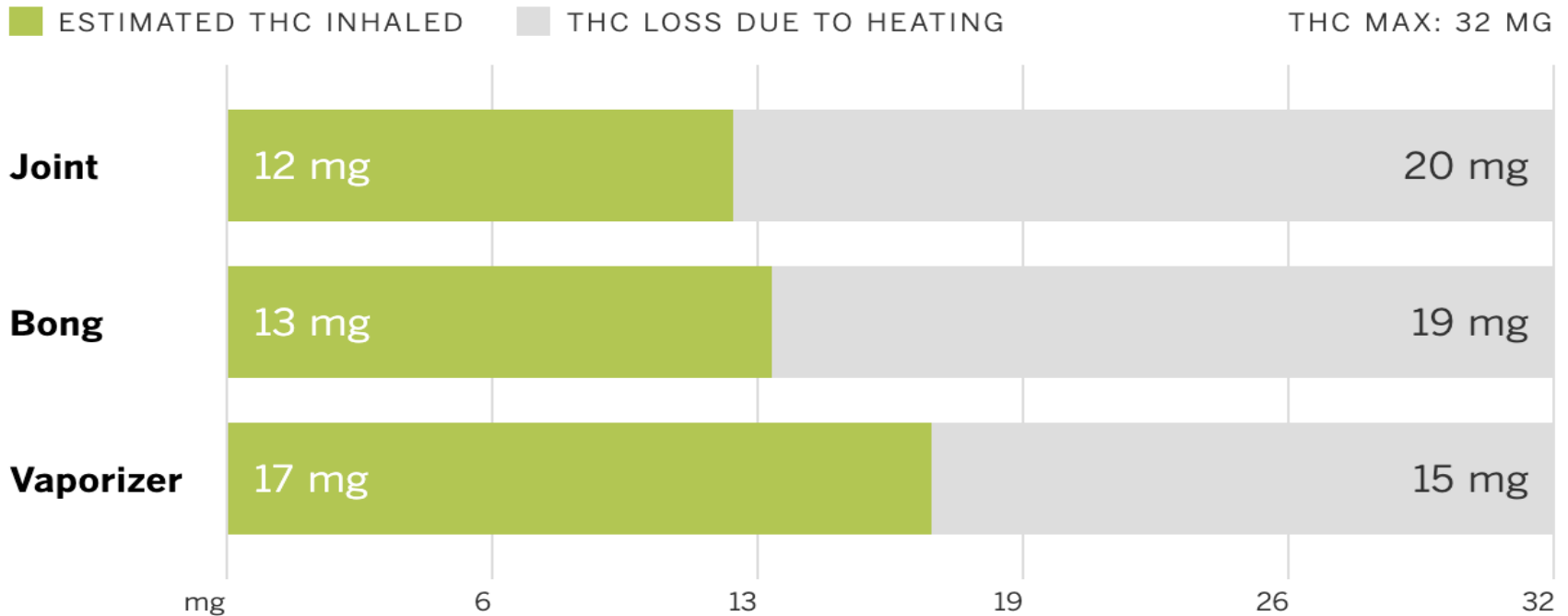
## Side Effects can be:-

- Drowsiness
- Dry Mouth – ability to produce Saliva can be effected
- Dizziness or Light Headed feeling
- Low Blood Pressure
- Slower Responses
- Interaction with Prescription Drugs - CBD impedes the activity of certain liver enzymes, which metabolizes pharmaceutical drugs.
